In the past both Israeli and Iranian leaders have expressed openness to the concept, although with conditions. In an opinion poll last November, 64 percent of Israeli Jews supported the idea of a nuclear-free zone. A 2007 poll in Iran found the Iranian people also supporting such a zone.

If this path is followed negotiations would be extremely difficult, but perhaps success would be more possible, since all the players would gain.
